1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

The institution was established at Parbhani which is a semi-urban district place, in **June 1984** with only Undergraduate courses i.e. B.A., B.Com. and B.Sc. Further, during the course of time the College introduced 18 Postgraduate courses and 14 Research Centres along with B.Voc. in Software Development and Retail Management.

The Management has constructed spacious, airy and beautiful building which is housing Arts, Commerce and Science College with state-of-art facilities on the campus. The institution, when in its teens, had undergone NAAC accreditation in August, 2003 and then the NAAC had awarded B++ status, consequently, in 2nd Cycle the NAAC awarded 'A" grade with 3.11 CGPA and A grade in 3rd Cycle with 3.15 CGPA in the academic year 2017-2018 in assessment and accreditation.

Besides, the institution has been awarded with "College with Potential for Excellence" status in 2006 by the UGC which graciously funded this institution in CPE and BSR Schemes with 0.6 and 1.32 crores respectively to boost to carry out research and developmental activities on the campus. After reviewing the progress made by the institution during the last 5 years the UGC has extended CPE status in 2011 and sanctioned 0.5 crores and again CPE status was continued for third time with the sanction of 1.50 crores to continue academic and research developmental activities of this college. The institute is also sanctioned 1.85 crores for B.Voc. Software Development and Retail Management Courses by the UGC. Besides, the college has been awarded with 'Best College Award' by the S.R.T.M. University, Nanded. Besides, the college received funding of Rs. 2.00 crore from RUSA.

Total

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:	Since the college runs multiple programs, in National Education Policy implementation process we have scope for multi-disciplinary courses combinations. In this college NEP would be implemented from the academic year 2024-2025. So, it is determined to offer even inter-disciplinary programs e.g. Sociology and Literature would be offered for comparative studies based on sociological theories. Our faculty in the Department of English worked on Inter-disciplinary projects, so such programs would be introduced in the next academic year 2024-2025.
2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	This college has been an affiliated education institution. Therefore, as per the directions of the

	UGC and the Swami Ramanand Teerth Marathwada University, the students are informed to register for ABC. The faculty of this college provides information to the students to obtain more credits by way of registering for a few NPTEL and MOOC courses and few certificate and diploma courses introduced in different departments.
3. Skill development:	The National Skills Qualification Frame Work (NSQF) has provided a wide range of qualifications. These qualifications are to be acquired through formal and non-formal as well informal learning resources. Therefore, this college has planned to provide such qualifications to the students so that they will be able to fulfill the demands of the society.
4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):	NEP will be implemented from the academic year 2024-2025 at UG. However, it is being implemented at PG from the academic year 2023-24. This college has planned and designed a few courses like certificate courses and diploma courses in Hindi, Marathi, English, Urdu. At present certificate course in Film Studies, Rational Thinking, Critical Thinking are planned to be introduced from 2024-2025. Online courses in this line from NPTEL and MOOCS will also be facilitated in the Language Laboratory and in the Computer Centre.
5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):	The students who had registered for B.Com, F.Y. or B.A. F.Y. would be provided elective in Indian systems in Ayurveda Medicine. The students in humanities would also be facilitated with electives in Yoga, Naturopathy so as to continue the benefit the people with the knowledge of traditions of medicine. The provisions will be incorporated into the curricular frame work from the 2024-2025. An effort to be made to provide innovative courses to fulfill the demands in society and labour market. Outcome based skill oriented courses such as Instructional Design, Narrative Medicine etc. would be introduced in the Department of English. A large number of elective courses in IKS would be introduced from the academic year 2024-2025.
6. Distance education/online education:	This College has centre for distance learning affiliated to the parent University. At present this college has facilitated Post graduate education in Marathi, Hindi, English, Urdu, Sociology and Public Administration.

Internal Assessment is mandatory process for all courses offered on the campus. Approximately 25 to 50 credits are reserved for this. For both theory and practical papers internal assessment is required. It is performed in the form of two internal tests, followed by seminar and tutorial work in each semester. Every faculty maintain a record of it. Mark lists are displayed for information to students. Before commencement of End Semester Examination (ESE), internal mark lists are submitted on line on university portal. Without internal assessment no student can clear the paper and his result will not be declared. So, it is a mandatory part of learning process. Since courses are designed by the University along with the nature of internal process of evaluation, here is not wide possibility to make transformations. However, in terms of maintaining the standard of assessment due care is taken to conduct the continuous internal evaluation on the basis of enriched output. The care is taken that along with continuous internal evaluation there is continuous improvement and enrichment. Besides, to support the mandatory process for all courses, additional efforts are made by way of suggesting additional assignments. Moreover, students are also enrolled in a few certificate courses so as to strengthen their learning experience.

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External assessment is mandatory process for all courses offered in campus. About 70 credits are reserved for external assessment. Both theory and practical paper assessment is carried by external examiners belonging to other institutions. At the end of End Semester Examination (ESE) papers are collected at District College Assessment Program (DCAP). Seat numbers of students are covered with bar code stickers so that blind assessment can takes place. After examiner assessment selected 30% papers are handed over to moderators. Moderator again reexamine papers. All papers are scrutinized for counting of marks. Unchecked pages are remarked and are get reexamined. Finally marks of moderator list are entered on online portal provided by university. Check lists are generated and they are get signed by concerned examiner and moderator. Finally all papers are dispatched to university examination section for further processing. There is a provision of rechecking and revaluation for students who are not satisfied with their assessment. Also Xerox copies of papers are provided to the students if required.

Practical examination for practical papers is conducted either at end of semester or at end of the year. For such examination there is a panel of external examiners. External examiners are called for practical examination. Paper is set by external examiners. For PG courses out of university examiners are preferred. After performing experiment, oral viva is conducted. Finally papers are assessed and marks are entered on online portal provided by university.

Thus we observe that external assessment is an important part of all courses offered in campus.

3.4 Extension Activities

This college is well known in the vicinity for its timely required social activities. Moreover a number of extension activities are carried out by the Institute in the neighborhood community in collaboration with NSS unit for sensitizing the students to various social issues such as:

- Extension lecture was organized on "New Education Policy 2020" at Shiradshahapur Dist. Parbhani under NSS Special Camp. The students were acquainted with new framework of the Education Policy. They realized that the New Education Policy gives wide scope for skill building and hence there is scope for employability.
- In continuation, extension lecture was organized on "Tissue Culture" at Shiradshahapur Dist. Parbhani under NSS Special Camp. The students were acquainted with techniques of Tissue Culture. They realized they that the advanced technique of tissue culture and method of biological research in which fragments of tissue can be transferred to the artificial environment.
- Extension lecture was organized on "Life Skills Deleted from the Curriculum" at Shiradshahapur Dist. Parbhani under NSS Special Camp. The students were suggested about the life skills like happiness, honesty, hardworking, moral, values etc. to be accomplished in day to day sociocultural exposures.
- Extension lecture was organized on "De-addiction" at Shiradshahapur Dist. Parbhani under NSS Special Camp. The students were made cautious about the bad effects of the addiction of smoking, tobacco chewing, alcohol drinking etc.
- Extension lecture was organized on "Budget" at Shiradshahapur Dist. Parbhani under NSS Special Camp. The students were informed about the Governmental sources of income and expenditure as well as students were familiarized with the different schemes of development.
- Extension lecture was organized on "Aids Control" at Shiradshahapur Dist. Parbhani under NSS Special Camp. The students were made aware of the severe and fatal consequences of AIDS. The lecture was also linked with ethics and morals. In continuation, the lecture on "The Role of Youth in Environment Conservation" presided over sustainable development through nature conservation.
- Three extension lectures were delivered respectively on "Organic Farming" which concentrated that there is hazardous effect on health due to the use of synthetic agro chemicals. A talk was also arranged on "Saint Literature and Importance of Yoga" which underlined the benefits of Yoga and teaching of Saints for ideal, social creation. Dnyanopasak Shikshan Mandal's College of Arts, Commerce and Science, Parbhani is famous for its discipline and verdant green campus, extended over an area of 6.07 acres 24564.95 sq.mtr with total built-up area of 11758.4 sq.mts is dedicated to attain academic excellence by providing quality education.

The campus accommodates various science and laboratories, ICT-enabled classrooms, a library, NSS rooms, ladies' common rooms, an auditorium, a conference hall and a canteen. There is a Central library with the total carpet area of 6,800 sq. ft. (631.75 Sq. mtr.) and seating capacity for 186 students. Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC) facility is available in the library. N-LIST/INFLIBNET and DELNET database facility is provided to all the staff and the students so that they can avail this facility in and outside the campus. The students and the staff can also access online books/journals from the institutional website. There are more than 58175 books and 150 journals/periodicals in the library. Photocopying facility with 1 machine is available in the library. The library access is from 7.30 a.m. to 9 p.m. on all working days. The average number of walks-in in the library is 163 per day.

The institution has provided a standard playground for sports like Volley-ball, Kho-Kho, Kabaddi, Cricket, etc. The 200 meter track for outdoor games is also provided. The required facilities are also made available for the indoor games like Badminton, Chess, Table-Tennis, Carrom, cycling, multistation Gym, Treadmill, etc. In the institute auditorium ultra-modern sound system is provided for promotion of music and cultural activities, which will support the academic and co-curricular activities. For celebration and expression of hidden talent of students the institution has provided one auditorium with capacity of 300 seats and an open air theatre on its ground. The Women's Hostel accommodates 140 girl students. The language lab in the department of English has been strengthened with the facility of 20 Computers. A Computer center is established under the grants of RUSA for 50 computers and many online examinations were conducted including University Ph.D. Entrance Test (PET), JEE, MHCET, CBT for Nursing Courses, Typing exams etc.

The college has provided 100 MBPS internet Lease line facilities and virtual lectures for better learning and also for effective teacher-student communication. Well-equipped Science Laboratories with LCD and Interactive KYAN Projector system are available in science departments so as to promote higher and skilled education and even for practical and dissertation work purposes.

The College has a well-developed botanic garden. It is dedicated to the collection, cultivation and display of a wide range of plants. There is a collection of various varieties of plants such as cacti and succulent plants, medicinal plants, herbs, and different plants from the local areas.

The college has one canteen, separate students corner for Boys and Girls for refreshment and group discussion. Generator Set of 52 KVA Capacity for sufficient power backup facility in the campus is installed. 6. Problems Encountered:

This practice has a number of limitations because this college is especially concerned with regular teaching at graduate and post graduate level and therefore, maximum time is spent in direct teaching - learning of different subjects as well as a number of co curricular and extracurricular activities are being conducted. So no time is left to tackle this issue systematically. At the same time, government doesn't provide any kind of independent officer and human resource to take care of the Employment Cell Unit.
